

MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

We are coming to the end of a two-year Annual Vision of Ministry: God's Story and Our Stories. It has been a wonderful vision that drew together our ministry toward a common theme and inspired creativity and faith!

You might remember this quote from Mark Yaconelli, the author of one of our All Church Reads: "If we don't pay attention to the relational nature of stories - both in their telling and in what is told - then we end up with stories (no matter how powerful their content) that function as junk food for the soul. Or worse, instruments of control and sedation." (Between the Listening and the Telling: How Stories Can Save Us).

As this Annual Vision comes to a close, I encourage you to reflect back on what you've learned about God's story and our story. Where have you seen your story and our church's story join God's story? What new voices have you heard as we sought to share our own experiences of God's grace? How does our history prepare us for the future God has in store? What story are you living and what story still waits to be told?

Rachel Mann, a priest in the Church of England, suggests that the kind of Christian story that is viable in our time is:

A story that has the character of a song one would want to sing, both alone and with others. A song that sings of the abundance of love. This is a song that holds all the stories we shall ever own up to and those that we, through shame or failure, cannot; it is a song that sings all the griefs we shall ever know; it is a song that does not need to be sung for it is always being sung in the silence of the universe, in the stirrings of birds, in the breeze and storm that tickle and shake trees; it is a song of industry and of rest. It is the sustaining song of the world. ... It is the universe hallowed and shot through with glory and grace and wounds. It is Christ who holds the world's griefs in his wounds and continues to cry out for a world of wounds at the Father's throne. It is the little story and the great one. It is a line of poetry and an epic. It is a word barely mumbled and the grandest novel. It is silence and the most riven cry. It is the word that dwells and drifts and anchors. It is the song that sings us in all our moments—our births, deaths, dreams, triumphs, and failures, in our competence and our ineptitude. It is the bread and cup that sustain us and expose our limitations. It is the precarious body that cannot be destroyed. (*Christian Century, December 2022*).

May we keep reading, keep telling, keep listening, and keep living God's Story and Our Stories, for they remind us who and whose we are, and who we are called to be.

SABBATICAL - DIRECTOR OF MUSIC MARGARET MONROE

Unity Presbyterian Church has long granted sabbatical leave to Ministers, Certified Educators, and Church Professionals according to approved guidelines. As recommended by Providence Presbytery's Sabbatical Leave policy, "Sabbatical leave is an extension of the Biblical concept of renewal through the Sabbath day and Sabbath year." It is a time to step away briefly from the persistent obligations of daily congregational life and to engage in a period of renewal and reflection. Renewal periods are not vacations, but times for intentional exploration and reflection, for regaining the enthusiasm and creativity for ministry, for discovering what will make the church leader's heart sing.

In recognition of her seven years of faithful ministry at Unity Presbyterian Church, Margaret Monroe is eligible for sabbatical. With the approval, prayers, and full support of the Human Resources Ministry Team, the Session, and Dr. Rich, Margaret's sabbatical will begin on Monday, June 23rd, and she will return on Monday, August 4th. She will be attending conferences, spending time with family, working on complex organ pieces, plus worshiping and learning from other congregations and faith communities. Margaret shared, "I am so appreciative to the church for this time of renewal, and I look forward to returning refreshed and ready for the upcoming program year!"

During this time, so that Margaret can focus on rest and renewal, she will not be answering phone calls, text messages, or emails. If you have questions that you would normally ask Margaret, please reach out to Matt Rich or the chair of the Worship and Music Ministry Team (Lauren Mobley). Patsy Surratt will be playing for worship on Sundays and working with the choir.


MARK YOUR CALENDAR - WORSHIP AT 10:00 AM EACH SUNDAY IN JULY

HURRICANE RECOVERY CONTINUES

May 15-19, Rev. Max Russell from Woodlawn Presbyterian Church in Sharon, SC, and five members here at Unity Presbyterian traveled to Western, NC to help with continued hurricane recovery. Their main work site was Marshall Presbyterian Church (MPC). The church had disastrous damage to their building from hurricane Helene. Marshall is a small town about 20 min north of Asheville and sits on the French Broad River. This area had about 26 feet of water that demolished many structures and gutted all the ground level floors that were not swept away. This left several feet of mud in the structures. MPC has most of the mud removed and everything stripped down to the foundation and framing. They are very short on funds to rebuild so our team from Unity was tasked with rebuilding and cleaning the floor structure for their choir and pulpit areas. This included changing it to be one level instead of a terraced level. If MPC had to pay a contractor to do the work, it would be cost prohibitive (likely over \$15,000). Our team was able to complete this floor structure so the contractors can come to do the finishing work. Howard was our main contact from MPC and just so happened to chair the Building and Grounds committee when they suffered this damage. Howard and a few of the church members we met are so grateful for what the Unity team was able to accomplish and get them to their next phase of rebuilding. We were grateful to partner with Rev. Russell at Woodlawn for this effort, and hope to continue to serve together as we can as we look for more opportunities to support recovery efforts.













DONATIONS FOR THE TRINIDAD SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

Nine of Unity's members, July 9-18 will bring a mission trip to Honduras. This will be Unity's 12th trip to the municipality of Trinidad, Copan. We will be working in a 10-house project in the neighborhood of San Juan Planes. We will be accompanied by Tim Wheeler, retired PCUSA mission co-worker. Members of past teams have met many children that are now in their teens and need help in completing their education. The 2025 team plans to take a monetary donation for the Trinidad Scholarship Committee to help these young people. We are asking for your help. 


ENDOWMENT IMPACT STATEMENT: NEEDLEPOINT PARAMENTS, A WORK IN PROGRESS

The Worship & Music ministry wanted to enhance our worship space with four sets of needlepoint paraments in each of the liturgical colors. Currently, fabrics of all 4 colors are paid for, thanks to an Endowment grant, and in storage at the church to be used when the pieces are stitched. The background fibers are all in stock and paid for. We have already begun stitching the purple set and one of the green pieces. We intend to do a Minute for Missions on June 8th to line up needle pointers to take on the two red pieces, the two white pieces, and bookmarks of all 4 colors. We are still waiting for the metallic fibers to use on the red set.

Below are photos of the green design and the purple design. Each color will have a separate design. Each large piece is 540 square inches of stitching, and the best stitchers can only do about 2 square inches per hour. This is a long process that promises to have a stunning outcome.

THANKS FOR "LIFTING UP" MINISTRY THROUGH UNITY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH



Thanks to everyone who made a commitment to share their time, talent, and financial resources with Unity's ministry as part of this year's campaign. The ministry and programs of our church are only possible through your generous support.

- 1) We had a 12% increase in the number of Time and Talent forms received and an 8% increase in the number of pledges received.
- 2) We currently have effective pledges that total just above \$1,450,000. This level of effective pledges represents around a \$60,000 increase (around 4.2%) in pledges over last year's campaign.
- 3) Coupled with our projected starting cash funds, this level of projected giving puts us in a good position for funding next year's budget, of \$1,705,000, a 4.2% increase over our 24/25 budget. Our ministry leaders and staff continue to work hard to manage costs and be good stewards of the financial resources entrusted to them.
- 4) Increases in the budget will fund:
- Enhancing the security of the church campus by implementing a new door locking system.
- Increasing our support of Unity's outreach partnerships, helping those in need both physically and financially.
- Increasing our support for our growing children and youth ministries.
- Providing our talented staff with the raises needed to keep up with the rising cost of living.
- Addressing the general rising cost of ministry in areas such as maintenance, utilities, and insurance costs.

This is the fifth consecutive year of increase in your level of pledged giving. You have, once again, enthusiastically responded to our campaign, and we are very thankful for this generosity! We look forward to this next program year as we continue to "Lift Up" each other and our neighbors in faith and in love.



WHAT IS A MAJOR MAINTENANCE RESERVE AND WHY DO WE MAINTAIN ONE?

A maintenance reserve is a dedicated pool of money set aside to cover the costs of maintaining and repairing our assets. It is a proactive financial strategy that contributes to the long-term financial health and stability of our property. Here are the reasons for establishing a maintenance reserve:

1. Ability to Cover Unexpected Repair Costs & Emergencies:

- Financial Safety Net: A reserve acts as a financial cushion to handle unexpected repairs, breakdowns, and emergencies, such as roof leaks, plumbing issues, or appliance failures.
- Prompt Repairs: Funds are readily available to address problems quickly, preventing further damage and minimizing disruptions.
- Avoids Debt Accumulation: Reduces the need to borrow money or use operating funds for unexpected expenses.
- 2. Preserves Asset Condition: Ensures regular maintenance and timely repairs, keeping assets in good and safe condition.

3. Ensuring Long-Term Cost Savings:

- Prevents Minor Issues from Escalating: Regular maintenance and prompt repairs can prevent minor problems from becoming major and costly issues.
- Extends Asset Lifespan: Proper maintenance and timely repairs can extend the lifespan of assets, reducing the need for premature replacements.
- Reduces Repair Costs: Addressing issues early can often be less expensive than dealing with extensive damage later.

4. Facilitates Better Financial Management:

- Consistent Cash Flow: A reserve fund helps to maintain consistent cash flow.
- Accurate Budgeting: Allows for better financial planning and budgeting by anticipating and allocating funds for future maintenance needs.

5. Compliance & Safety:

- Ensures Compliance with Regulations: Ensures that properties are maintained in compliance with building codes, safety standards, and legal requirements.
- Addresses Safety Hazards Promptly: Enables prompt repair of safety hazards and reducing potential liabilities.

The established benchmark for Unity is to maintain at least 5% of the insured value of the property in our maintenance reserve. As a result, we were able to immediately begin clean-up and repairs after our 2018 fire and have not had to cut ministry budgets to address unexpected repairs. During the past year, from our reserve, we have

- pointed up the brick mortar work in our walkways,
- painted the outdoor, metal railings
- addressed the paving issues campus-wide.

The paving project was a \$100,000+ expense and our reserves are now at 3.2% of the properties insured value of \$14,857,000.

Overall, we are financially sound, but Stewardship and the long-term planning committee will be working on plans to reestablish funds to our benchmark.


